RACING BIZ STORY ON DEL 'CAP CASE IS UP FOR STAN BERGSTEIN AWARD DETAILS LEGAL ISSUE IN ENFORCING CORTICOSTEROID REGULATION WIDESPREAD RAMIFICATIONS OR 1-TIME 'PROSECUTORIAL DISCRETION?'

Team Valor International has nominated a story from the *Racing Biz* website on a Delaware medication case for the Stan Bergstein Writing Award.



Doug McCoy's and Frank Vespe's piece "Pletcher overage that wasn't has major implications for racing" details a medication violation from last summer's Delaware Handicap that the state decided to drop. When trainer Todd Pletcher's attorney, Karen Murphy, asked for the published, peer-reviewed science behind a threshold for the corticosteroid betamethasone, which was found to be in excess in the Pletcher-trained Princess of Sylmar following the 2014 Delaware Handicap, she received only limited information.

Murphy said what she did receive was legally insufficient. A Delaware state attorney subsequently recommended that stewards drop

the case, and Murphy said the ramifications could be widespread in American racing's push for uniform medication rules.

McCoy and Vespe also noted that the drug positive was absent from a daily log that Delaware stewards maintain and usually includes such cases.
